The American University in Cairo (AUC), Egypt Ministry of Health and Population (MOHP), and Egypt Ministry of Planning and Economic Development (MPED) are hosting a strategic meeting February 6th and 7th to discuss the regional needs for strengthening evidence-based policies and actions to support healthy aging. The meeting aims to investigate the regional demands and to launch an initiative for an long-term aging study modeled according to international and well-established experience in the US and Europe. Such an experience provides a rich evidence base model that that has successfully contributed to knowledge and influenced policies and actions (e.g. health care, health insurance, pension and social protection) in more than 50 Countries in Europe, Asia, and the American Continent. It also sets the basis for global collaboration and state-of-the-art training.

The meeting is organized by the Institute of Global Health and Human Ecology (IGHHE) and the Social Research Center (SRC) of AUC, in collaboration and with support from the World Health Organization Eastern Mediterranean Regional Office (WHO/EMRO), the US National Institute of Aging(NIA), the International Health and Retirement Study (HRS), the Harmonized Cognitive Assessment Protocol study (HCAP), the Survey of Health and Retirement in Europe (SHARE), and the Global Brain Health Institute (GBHI).

The meeting draws on the international experience and expertise, the current regional efforts, and the experience of the Egyptian initiative EM-age at AUC.




